



## COMMUNITY BUILDERS OF COLOR COALITION FIGHT FOR EQUITY: GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION FUND

The Community Builders of Color Coalition (The Coalition), led by the African American Alliance of CDFI CEOs, is a national network of 19 financial institutions led by people of color working together to ensure low-income and disadvantaged communities can equitably benefit from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund.

**Our Vision: To help eradicate the disproportionate impact of climate change on low-income and disadvantaged communities by sufficiently capitalizing and equipping BIPOC-led organizations deeply rooted in and serving disenfranchised populations.**

Here's what the Coalition believes the EPA should do:



### 1 EPA TO LEAD WITH EQUITY IN ALL ASPECTS OF THE FUND'S OPERATION

At least 40% of awarded capital should go to community economic development lenders who are representative of and embedded in the communities they serve.

EPA SHOULD PRIORITIZE A JUST ENERGY TRANSITION AND APPLY PRINCIPLES OF EQUITY TO THE GRANT AWARD PROCESS.

EPA SHOULD LEAD WITH ENERGY EFFICIENCY AS A STRATEGY TO MAXIMIZE GHG REDUCTIONS IN LOW-INCOME AND DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES WHILE ALSO HELPING TO REDUCE ENERGY BURDEN.

EPA MUST ENSURE THAT EQUITY AND JUSTICE ARE EMBEDDED IN ALL PROCESSES RELATED TO ENGAGING/LEVERAGING PUBLIC AND PRIVATE FINANCIAL RESOURCES.

EPA SHOULD DIRECT FUNDS TO COMMUNITY LENDERS, LIKE CDFIS, MDIS, AND CREDIT UNIONS, WHO SPECIALIZE IN SERVING LOW-INCOME AND DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES AND BORROWERS.
